EAA AirVenture Oshkosh 2004 is almost here!

Extractions from EAA e-Hotline

EAA AirVenture Oshkosh has always been the home of innovation, new announcements, and looking forward to what's on the horizon. That's why this year's theme, "Launching the Next Century of Flight," takes on even more meaning.

Every year much of the anticipation focuses on innovation, technology, and what will be the "next big thing." With forums and presentations, the likes of the X Prize's \$10 million race to space, Burt Rutan's leading contender Space-ShipOne homebuilt private spacecraft, and NASA's Mach 7 (soon shooting for Mach 10) aircraft X-43, there will be plenty of innovation to talk about.

An expected record number of exhibitors are coming with new technology both in the cockpit and aircraft design. EAA expects news on the rulemaking package before the start of convention, and when it comes EAA will be ready with the latest information and most learned industry and government experts at forums and the Sport Pilot Center, ready to answer questions from interested enthusiasts.

Burt Rutan to Present 'Fun at Mojave' at Theater in the Woods. Aircraft design pioneer Burt Rutan will present a very special evening program at Theater in the Woods entitled "Fun at Mojave," on Thursday, July 29, during EAA AirVenture Oshkosh 2004. The presentation will most likely include the latest information regarding two major projects - White Knight/SpaceShipOne and GlobalFlyer - in progress at Rutan's aircraft design company, Scaled Composites, located at Mojave Airport, California.

White Knight/SpaceShipOne aims to become the first private aircraft to achieve feasible, repeatable suborbital space flight in the X Prize competition. With the GlobalFlyer, world aviation record holder Steve Fossett plans to become the first person to achieve a solo, nonstop circumnavigation without refueling, replicating the journey of Rutan's Voyager in 1986. Time of the presentation will be announced as we draw nearer to EAA AirVenture.

NASA Evening Program to Discuss the Future of Flight. Any discussion about launching the next century of flight has to include NASA. At EAA AirVenture Oshkosh 2004 Wednesday (July 28), Theater in the Woods hosts a special NASA evening presentation that will highlight several of the agency's projects, most notably the X-43 Hyper X aircraft and its successful Mach 7 mission over the Pacific Ocean on March 27 this year. The X-43 was the first airborne test of a supersonic combustion ramjet engine (scramjet) and is scheduled to attempt a Mach 10 flight in the fall.

Feel The Need??

Well, now you can clear out the garage and put together a race-bred airplane from the folks who brought you the Nemesis F-1 racer (47 victories in 50 starts, 16 world speed records). The crew has translated their racing design into the NXT, a two-place speedster that will have its official unveiling at EAA AirVenture in late July.



Designers and builders Jon and Patricia Sharp say the first of the kit-derived aircraft is ready for flight-testing and they hope to have it flying at Oshkosh.

Others hope (some with good reason) that the aircraft will eventually run better than 350 mph at 20,000 feet. With computer-finessed aerodynamics, a 2200-pound all-up gross (including 500 pounds of fuel) and a Lycoming 540 up front, the NXT may be the hottest homebuilt available. The Sharps are being coy about performance data, saying they want to state the real figures and not computer projections. They were a little less shy about such predictions a couple of years ago, however, when, according to their Web site, they figured the little composite taildragger would hit 400 mph at 20,000 feet. That was with a similarly husky Continental 550 howling under the cowl. Lycoming has since become a Nemesis sponsor. There's a price for all that quickness. The kit will sell for \$129,000 and the engine, prop and electronics will put it over \$200,000.
